March Fly of the Month



Instructions by Bill
"Woody" Woodward

1. Tie in thread at midpoint of hook shank and wrap back to hook bend. (If making a bead head fly, insert bead on hook before tying in thread.)
2. Tie in 10-15 pheasant tail fibers at the hook bend to form tail. Wrap thread over butt end of hair to middle of hook shank, then cut off remaining hair butt fibers. Let thread hang.
3. Tie in a 2-3" inch length of oval gold tinsel at the hook bend with its length extending out over the hook bend. Wrap thread back over tinsel butt and return the thread to the hook bend.
4. Apply hare's mask dubbing to thread and wrap it forward to the middle of the hook shank forming a small tapered abdomen.
5. Wrap the tinsel forward over the dubbed abdomen in 4-5 evenly spaced turns and tie off with several thread turns. Trim off excess ribbing.
6. Tie in a 1/2" wide turkey quill segment, shiny side up and pointing toward hook bend, at front of the abdomen. Snip off butt end of quill segment. Let thread hang.

Hot Spot GRHE Nymph

Recipe

Hook.....Nymph, size 8-16
Thread.....Color to match thorax, 6/0
Tail.....Hare's mask guard hairs, Brown
 hackle fibers, or Pheasant tail fibers
Rib.....Oval gold tinsel or copper wire
Body.....Hare's ear dubbing, light
Thorax.....Bright colored dubbing of your choice
Wingcase...Turkey quill segment or Pheasant tail
 fibers (coated with fixative)
Head.....Thread (Brass bead optional)

7. Apply generous amount of brightly colored dubbing (Orange, Red, Yellow, Blue, Pink, etc.) to the thread and, ensuring that quill tie-in point is covered, wrap the dubbed thread forward to about one hook eye length behind the hook eye (or bead head). Ensure that the thorax is more heavily dubbed and thicker than the abdomen.
8. Pull the turkey quill segment forward over the thorax to just behind hook eye (or bead head) and tie off with several thread turns to form wingcase. Be sure to keep the wingcase centered on top of the thorax. Trim off any excess quill segment.
9. Form a thread head, whipfinish, trim thread and apply head cement.
10. Using dubbing needle or brush, pluck out fibers from bottom of thorax to form legs.

Note: This "Hot Spot" technique can be used with almost any nymph pattern. Fish really key in on the bright thorax. In off-colored water, use fluorescent colors for best results. Hot Spot nymph patterns are also deadly on bluegills and crappie.

In today's class, we covered the fundamentals of wrapping. Jim's setup made it easy for the class to see the wrapping demonstrations in detail.



Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing

The 2020 Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing program kicked off on February 19th with the start of the very popular rod building class. We had nine veterans for this first class. Participants were provided with their rod kits and Bill Bennett gave an overview of the class and rod-building tips. That was followed by removing burrs from the rod guides and temporarily attaching guides to the rods according to standard measurements. On February 26th Bill provided instruction on wrapping. This was followed by participants fine-tuning their guide positions with the rods under stress. And some began practicing the wrapping technique.

The Why and How

I recently read a dedication in a fly fishing book to the author's father. His father had given him his first fly fishing kit for his seventh birthday beginning a lifetime of pleasure and adventure.

My grandfather gave me my first pocketknife and flagged down a N.O. & W. train for my first train ride. What I did not know was that grandpa was a fly-fisherman. Not until thirty-three years after his death when by default I inherited his last fly-fishing kit.

Grandpa was a giant standing at five-foot six, wearing a size six shoe, and 6 7/8 hat. He was a brakeman for the short-line, an avid hunter, fisherman, and smoked White Owl tobacco. His house was built by the Delaware & Hudson Railroad in 1851 as a way house for workers and beasts hauling coal cars on the gravity railroad between the coal mines in Carbindale and the canal boats at Honesdale, PA. The Van Hawken trout stream ran thirty feet in front of his house and twenty feet behind the red one-room schoolhouse my father attended for eight years.

Once while visiting Grandpa he asked if I wanted to go fishing after dinner. I was ten. We took the old Buick up to Promton Dam, staked a metal hook stringer into the bank with a stout stick of unknown origin, and started fishing. Before long Grandpa was into the

walleye and perch; building a nice stringer. From above us came a voice:

"Charlie is that you".

"Yep". Grandpa replied.

"Have any fish on that stringer"?

"For awhile".

With a chuckle Joe O'Dell Grandpa's friend, neighbor, and fisheries warden walked on down the shoreline. When it was too dark to see, grandpa freed the fish on the stringer and we went home happy. That was how I learned about seasons and limits.

Dad had lived his life very frugally once even selling the frames around the family pictures. Dad stopped hunting and fishing when we moved to Alabama in 1964, six hundred miles south of grandpa and where he had grownup. Dad died in Texas four days after my sixty-second birthday, twelve hundred miles from the Van Hawken. For some reason for all his intent to shun the past, for he was an adopted son born of the depression, dying penniless, he had preserved the one thing that he thought defined the only father he ever knew, Grandpa's fly fishing gear. I inherited that kit because my brothers were not interested in fishing. Perhaps Dad knew that one of us, perhaps me, would find value in what he valued and take up where grandpa had left off. So, I have with pleasure, adventure, and new friends. J.W

Cold Water Safety: Surviving a Cold-Water Accident

Spring is coming, but water temps will be cool for a good while. And the water does not have to be very cool to exact a toll on our bodies. Thanks to Jeff Warden for passing along this information.

When preparing for a boating trip, the easiest but most dangerous thing to overlook is maintaining your body's temperature. Water cooler than the normal body temperature of 98.6 degrees can cause heat loss. Cold water will cool a body 25 times faster than cold air of the same temperature.

Falling into cold water triggers the body's cold water immersion responses, beginning with an uncontrollable gasping reflex. A well-fitted lifejacket will keep the airway out of the water -- which is most important when the gasping reflex begins. Heart rate and blood pressure increase dramatically, increasing the risk for cardiac arrest. The victim may hyperventilate and find it difficult to get air into the lungs.

Any water less than 59 degrees will trigger the physical response to cold water, but some studies suggest that the water can be as warm as 68 degrees. The colder the water, the more severe the response. Total immersion in cold water is very painful and the disoriented victim can quickly panic. With these combined reactions, the victim may drown quickly. The best prevention for this danger is to wear a lifejacket.

The colder the water, the greater the risk to the unprepared person. If the water temperature is under 50 degrees, the window of opportunity for rescue is only a few minutes if the involved person is not dressed for the water conditions. Nearly 90% of boating fatalities are due to drowning and nearly half of those are attributed to the effects of immersion in cold water.

Should an immersion occur, try to get out of the water as quickly as possible. Do not try to remove clothing or shoes. Air trapped between layers of clothing will help keep a person afloat and also protect from direct exposure to cold water.

Should you manage to keep your head above water and stay afloat, the following chart provides a general idea of survival times in water of varying temperatures. Factors that may alter these estimates include clothing or protective gear, the individual's health condition, and water conditions.

Survival Time		
Water Temperature	Exhaustion	Death
32.5	Under 15 min.	15 min. or less
32.5-40	15-30 min.	30-90 min
40-50	30-60 min.	1-3 hrs.
50-60	1-2 hrs.	1-6 hrs.
60-70	2-7 hrs.	2-40 hrs.
70-80	3-12 hrs.	3 hrs.-indefinite

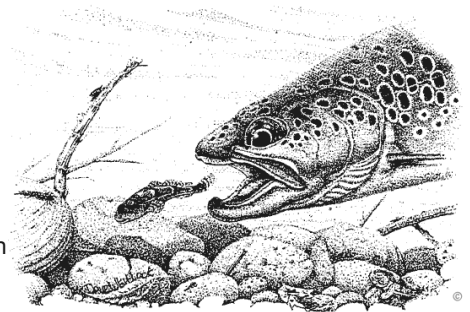

2020 Trout Stocking Dates

Just over 83,000 rainbow trout will be released this spring at 66 Ohio public lakes and ponds. Rainbow trout releases will take place across Ohio from March 13 - May 17 as long as areas are ice-free and accessible to anglers. Stocking of these public lakes and ponds are excellent opportunities for families to fish together. Fishing for catchable-sized trout is a great way to introduce young people to the outdoors. Rainbow trout are raised at state fish hatcheries and measure 10-13 inches before they are released by the ODNR Division of Wildlife. The daily catch limit for inland lakes is five trout per angler with no minimum size limit.
